I had booked in for an acupuncture treatment with Dr Chen Dan to learn more about AcuMedic. Dr Chen explained that

become widely recognised throughout the world. Problems commonly treated include: Addiction, obesity, migraines, arthritis, impotence, depression, anxiety, psoriasis and many more,

Before my treatment, my energy/ stress levels, sleep, digestion and lifestyle were taken into consideration and my tongue and pulse examined. Interestingly, to the trained eye, the tongue can be used as a map to assess the condition of your internal organs as well as your mental and emotional health. Dr Chen showed me a, 'Which Tongue Are You?' leaflet with pictures of different coloured tongues. Two were circled suggesting a qi deficiency and damp retention, which could have been due to lack of sleep.

The acupuncture treatment involved the insertion of very fine needles into various points throughout my body to unblock the flow of gi (chi) and relieve tension in my upper back and shoulders. I was surprised by how painless the experience was and soon drifted into a deep state of relaxation. Acupuncture was incredibly soothing- not painful at all. I felt calm and less tense afterwards, however patients are advised to undergo several treatments for it to take effect properly, especially when treating more serious illnesses.

This was my first experience of Acumedic but I will be returning again, perhaps for Chinese reflexology or a facial massage. The staff here were kind, welcoming and Dr Chen who treated me was highly professional, experienced and put me at ease. If you do suffer from migraines, depression, addiction or any of the problems listed above, it's definitely worth giving acupuncture a go.
